



The feedback offers valuable insights into students' perceptions of teaching quality, mentorship, institutional support, and opportunities for academic growth. The comprehensive analysis of the responses in different categories:

1. Teachers' Preparation for Classes:




Analysis: The majority (69%) rated the teacher's preparation as "Very Good," with 25% rating it as "Excellent," indicating a strong overall performance in class preparation.

2. Teachers' Communication Skills:




Analysis: Around 77% of the students rated the communication skills of teachers as "Excellent" or "Very Good." Only a small percentage rated it as "Good," showing overall satisfaction with teachers' communication skills.

3. Approach towards Teaching:




Analysis: A mix of responses here, with a large group finding the approach to teaching "Excellent" or "Good." However, 32% rating it as "Good" shows room for improvement.

4. Internships, Student Exchange Programs and field visits.




Analysis: This category shows some inconsistency, with only about 54% giving "Excellent" or "Very Good" ratings. There's noticeable feedback in the "Fair" and "Average" categories, suggesting the need for more initiatives or better communication of existing programs.

5. Syllabus Coverage:




Analysis: 75% of the students indicated that 85% or more of the syllabus was covered, reflecting a solid commitment to syllabus completion.

6. Illustration of Concepts:




Analysis: The majority of students appreciated the use of models and examples in teaching, with nearly 79% rating it as "Excellent" or "Very Good."

7. Identification of Student Strengths:




Analysis: Around 83% of the students rated the identification of strengths and challenges as "Excellent" or "Very Good."

8. Help with Addressing Student Weaknesses:




Analysis: The responses are overwhelmingly positive, with 80% giving ratings of "Excellent" or "Very Good," reflecting the teachers' ability to guide students.

9. Continuous Teaching Monitoring and Improvement:




Analysis: 79% of responses indicate satisfaction with institutional efforts to improve teaching quality.

10. Student-Centric Methods:




Analysis: While 72% of students rated this aspect positively, there are significant "Good" responses, signalling opportunities to enhance participative and experiential learning techniques.

11. Employability Skill Development:




Analysis: 77% believe that efforts to impart skills necessary for employability are "Excellent" or "Very Good," with 12% rating them as "Fair" or "Average."

12. Use of ICT Tools:




Analysis: A mixed response in this category, with 50% stating that 70% or more ICT tools are used during teaching. However, some improvements can be made in increasing the use of digital tools.

13. Overall Quality of Teaching-Learning:




Analysis: 75% of students rate the overall quality as "Very Good" or "Excellent," indicating strong satisfaction with teaching and learning at the institution.

14. Facilitating Cognitive, Social, and Emotional Growth:




Analysis: 74% rated this as "Very Good" or "Excellent," though there is a moderate level of "Good" responses, indicating a need for enhanced mentorship.

15. Mentors follow the students in given tasks:




Analysis: The majority of students, 88%, felt that mentors provided consistent guidance, though 12% rated the mentorship process as "Good" or "Fair."

16. Exam Evaluation Process:




Analysis: A significant number of students (71%) rated the exam evaluation process as "Excellent" or "Very Good," which shows confidence in the integrity of the evaluation system. However, 26% rated it "Good" or lower, suggesting that a noticeable proportion of students may perceive room for improvement in the fairness or transparency of the process.

17. Internal Evaluation Process:




Analysis: The internal evaluation process was rated positively by 81% of students, indicating that most feel it is fair. However, a smaller group (19%) may feel that there is some level of inconsistency or unfairness, which could be improved with clearer grading criteria or feedback mechanisms.

18. Expected Capabilities, Course Outcomes, and Programme Outcomes:




Analysis: An impressive 81% of students feel that teachers effectively communicate course and program outcomes. However, the remaining 19% might feel that communication on expectations and outcomes is lacking, which could be addressed through more explicit guidance or reinforcement of objectives during the course.

19. Encouragement in Extracurricular and Co-Curricular Activities:




Analysis: The majority (71%) of students feel encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities. However, 29% rated this as "Good" or lower, suggesting that more could be done to engage all students in extracurricular and co-curricular activities actively.

20. Placement Opportunities



Analysis: Satisfaction with placement opportunities is mixed, with only 42% of students rating it as "Excellent" or "Very Good." A significant 58% of students rated it "Good" or lower, indicating that the institution may need to enhance its placement support, either by increasing the number of opportunities or providing better preparation and training for job placements.

21. Opportunities to Learn and Grow:



Analysis: Around 52% of students rated the learning and growth opportunities as "Excellent" or "Very Good," while 48% rated them as "Good" or lower. This suggests a fairly even split in student perceptions, with almost half feeling that the opportunities provided could be more diverse, accessible, or impactful.
